Getting there and back:

Participants will meet the professors in Hilo, HI on May 30, 2024 and travel with the group for 13 days.

Students will make their own arrangements to get to Hilo, and return home from Lihue, Kauai.

Participants may choose to extend their trip by adding days on other islands either before May 30 or after June 11.

Getting around the islands:

We will use rental vans.

An Inter-island flight from Kailua-Kona, Big Island to Lihue, Kauai will be pre-arranged for the group.

Accommodations:

All hotel accommodations will be booked for the group for dates May 30-June 11, 2024.

Mid-level lodging, double occupancy, 1 or 2 beds, we will try to honor participant's preferences.
